FROM THE PRESIDENT

I was pleased to attend the RAR National Council meeting here in Canberra along with representatives of the other Battalion Associations and the State RAR Associations. Some of you would be aware that we became affiliated with RAR National some years ago, and while their focus includes camaraderie, their main body of work is in ex-service welfare and veterans' advocacy. This is the second national meeting that I have attended on your behalf and I am pleased to advise that they are representing us very effectively and the largest representative body within the Ex-Service Organisation scene.

They are involved some of our most challenging matters such as veterans' mental health and suicide, and they have had significant input to the reform effort underway in the Dept of Veterans' Affairs, and are representing us in a very calm and deliberate manner. Minutes of the meeting will be

posted on our website soon. It is not the role of our Association to become involved in matters of advocacy directly, but if you wish to offer suggestions or constructive criticism on the matters listed in the minutes then I will be pleased receive your thoughts.

I am also pleased to note the plans by various Company groups to conduct small scale reunions in Adelaide on ANZAC Day in 2020. After much discussion, the executive has agreed that due to the average age of our membership the larger scale all-inclusive reunions which we have historically conducted will not attract sufficient attendance. therefore encourage the more informal gatherings on a smaller scale as described in our strategic plan.

7 RAR has adopted a routine of marching with the colours on ANZAC Day in Adelaide city, and providing representation in nearby towns in South Australia. Additionally, the RAR community is well represented in the march in Adelaide, so for those who are fit and able, we would encourage you to use this as an opportunity to gather



with old comrades. If you are unable to march, then you can just as easily be a spectator at what is a large parade through a picturesque part of the city.

The only matter I would raise in regard to informal reunions of this nature is the desire to visit the Battalion at Edinburgh. Unfortunately the security arrangements at Edinburgh are very stringent; this is due to the defence platforms and capabilities at Edinburgh and because of the increased threat to our bases from extremist and issue motivated groups. The current requirement is for every visitor to have prior approval and be individually escorted while on base. Additionally, Edinburgh is a major defence establishment with thousands of servicemen and women and contracted staff entering and departing the base throughout the day.

Therefore group visits to the Battalion are extremely difficult for the Battalion to arrange and are a very serious stuff around for the soldiers. For these reasons I would discourage you from requesting the visit the base. The open

bases that many of you would recall do not exist in our post September 11

All of these men served in 7 RAR in recent years and on your behalf I wish them the best of luck in their upcoming appointments.

BG BOAR update

As the Ready Battle Group Designate for the 2019/20 period, the 7th Battalion has enjoyed a professionally challenging and developmental training year. This training has recently peaked with participation on the Joint Warfar

e Series (JWS) 19 as the Ground Combat Element (GCE) and Exercise Talisman Sabre (Ex TS) as a Mechanised Battle Group.

The JWS provided a challenging and unique training continuum for the Battle Group, comprising of various bespoke capabilities and split across two LHDs, the HMAS Canberra and Adelaide. The Battle Group deployed in a unique configuration, with one Mechanised Rifle Company, one Air Mobile Rifle Company, one Engineer Squadron, one Cavalry Troop, one Artillery Platoon with two M-777s in the Air Mobility role and other attachments from 1MP Battalion, 1 Int Battalion, 6 Engineer Support Regiment and 1 Combat Signals Regiment.

During the activity the Battle Group was able to further enhance the capability of amphibious operations and showcase the LHDs as fit for purpose for a Mechanised BG. Some of the key areas of development included advancements on the previous GCE rotations in the area of employment of

simultaneous multi-platform Ship To Objective Manoeuvre (STOM) from two LHDs, personnel tracking, integration with other government agencies and the conduct of Humanitarian Assistance, Non-Combatant Evacuation Operations and Security and Stability Operations in a semi-permissive environment.

Of particular note was the capability which the M113AS4 platform brought to the Amphibious Task Group (ATG). Unlike previous experience for the ATG, predominantly seeing GCE deploy in wheeled vehicles, the M113AS4 proved to be a vehicle with superior mobility. This was both during more mundane tasks, such as movement on the LHD and during the conduct of tactical actions in the littoral environment where the vehicle's mobility could not be matched.

The JWS continued into Exercise TS 19 after a short port visit in Brisbane and Cairns for HMAS Adelaide and Canberra respectively. This activity saw the successful amphibious lodgement of BG Boar as part of the ATG in Stanage Bay, prior to returning to 1 Brigade. The return to 1 Brigade saw the BG re-grouped and importantly reintegrating with C Coy, who had been attached to 1 Armed Regiment during

the JWS for a CTC led BG Warfighter Exercise.

Exercise TS 19 provided BG Boar with the opportunity to conduct training for high end warfighting operations against a near peer. This training activity presented many opportunities for the Battalion to work closely with other 1 Brigade units and other Force Elements from across Army. Working

in a highly contested environment with a myriad of assets and attached forces has set the 7th Battalion in good order to assume the duties of the Ready Battle Group later this year.



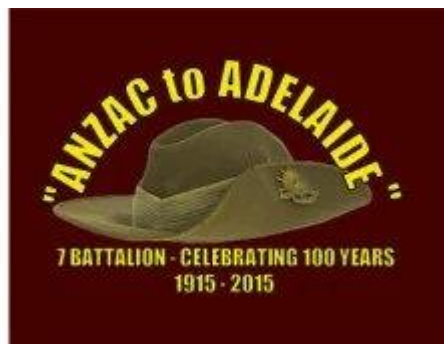












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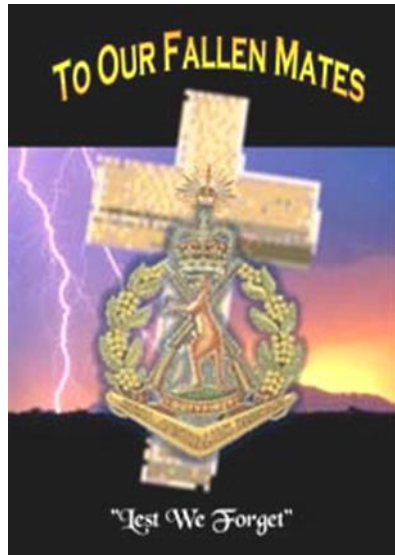

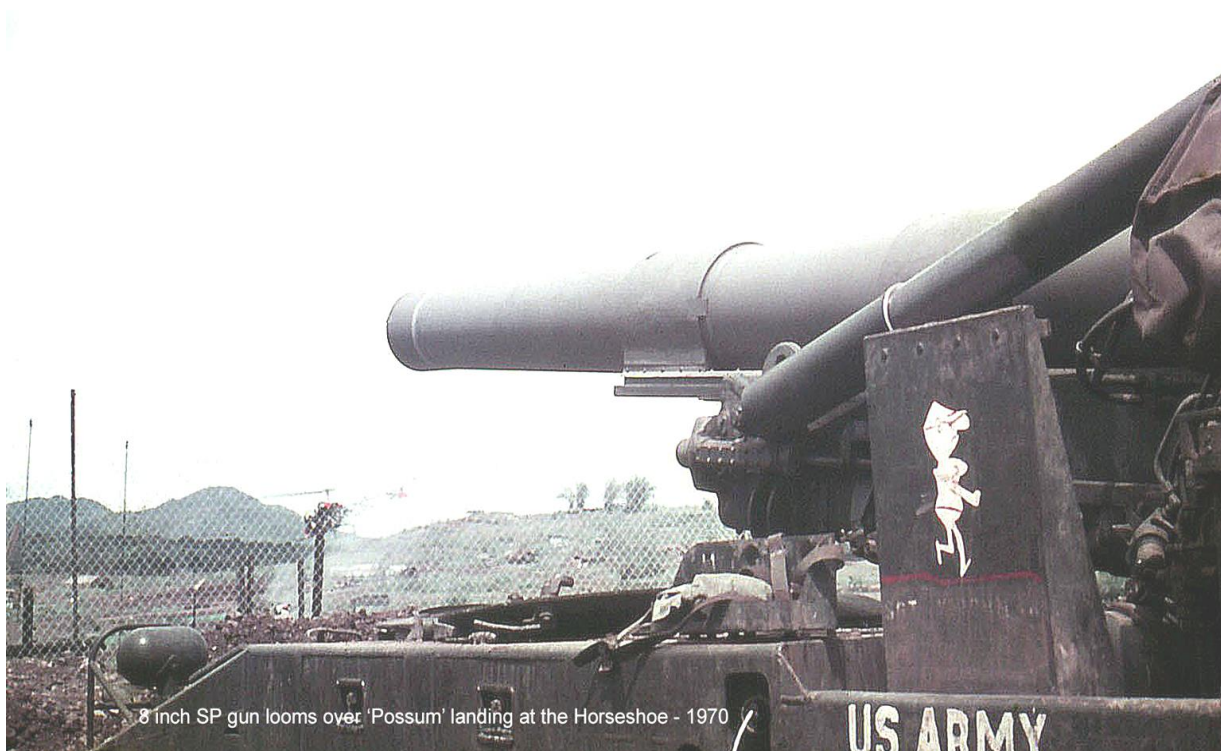

Michael Berrigan

Michael was with 5 Pn, B Coy 7RAR in Vietnam 1967; he was severely wounded in the head by artillery shrapnel on 30th November 1967. He spent most of the last 44 years in hospital or nursing homes.

In recent years we gave him the honour of leading 7RAR in the ANZAC Day parade.

I will advise you of funeral details when they come to hand.

We were also joined also by two of our members in wheelchairs, one of them being Michael Berrigan who was so badly wounded in 1967.

BERRIGAN Michael John 3788600 Died peacefully on Sunday Oct. 23, 2011. Dearly loved son of Rosemary (dec.) and Gerald (dec.). Beloved brother of Stephen, Geraldine, Peter (dec.), Angela, Timothy (dec.), Christopher and Andrew. Brother-in-law of Denise, Tony, Rosemary, Cliff, Jan and Belinda and loved uncle of their families. Casualty of War, finally released from his injuries after 44 years of courage and fortitude. Vale to the Wounded Soldier Rest In Peace

Michael John Berrigan was born on September 1945 and died at his home on 23rd October 2010. His death is a direct result of the wounds he received on 30th November 1967 as an Australian soldier in the Vietnam War. He may well be the last Australian to die as a direct result of the Vietnam War.

Michael was a promising law student at Melbourne University when he received the news of his call-up. Though he could have

deferred, he chose to enter National Service, and, after his training joined the Seventh Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment for its first tour of Vietnam in 1967. He joined 5 Platoon, B Company which was commanded by Lieutenant Wal Harris. Members of this platoon have become famous as the soldiers pictured in Sergeant Michael Coleridge's iconic photograph of the platoon waiting to board US Army helicopters that year -the photo is frequently used and is the centerpiece of the Vietnam Memorial in Anzac Parade in Canberra. Michael does not appear in it, but all the soldiers in it were his mates.

Michael was a trusted and reliable member of this platoon and was known to be a good shot, an important attribute for an infantryman.

On 30th November 1967, 5 Platoon was part of the B Company force preparing to assault a Viet Cong bunker system in Phuoc Tuy Province. The artillery forward observer with the company arranged and adjusted a preliminary bombardment of the camp. When

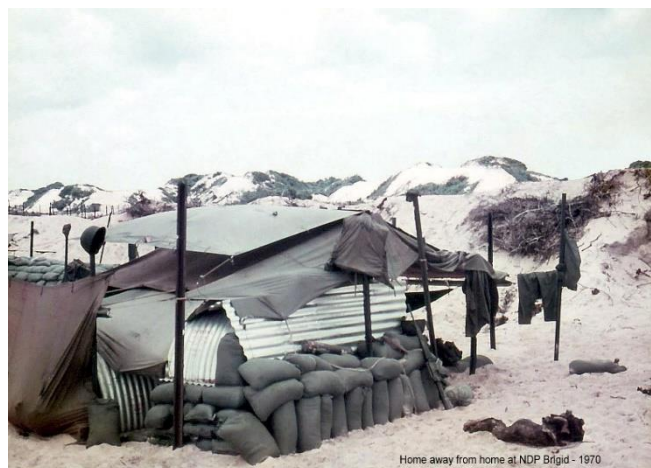
he called for fire-for-effect, one round detonated hit a tree 50 metres from the company forming-up-place and the resultant shrapnel wounded two Australian soldiers, one of them Michael Berrigan. Shrapnel entered his right temple and went to the left side of his skull, without breaking out of the skin. The company medic gave him mouth-to-mouth resuscitation after he had stopped breathing.

Berrigan was evacuated by a Dustoff helicopter. It took three months for him to

regain consciousness. He was hospitalised on his return to Australia for many years, later moving to special accommodation in Highett where he died.

We should always remember Michael Berrigan. Many of those with the mental wounds from the Vietnam war are still with us. Sometimes those with the physical wounds are forgotten by the Army and the nation. He paid a great price for his country.

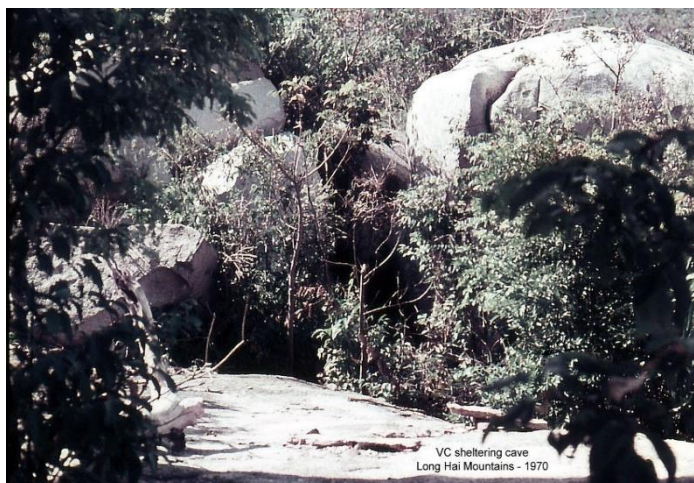

The Battle of Suối Châu Pha - 1967 (Vietnamese Interpretation)

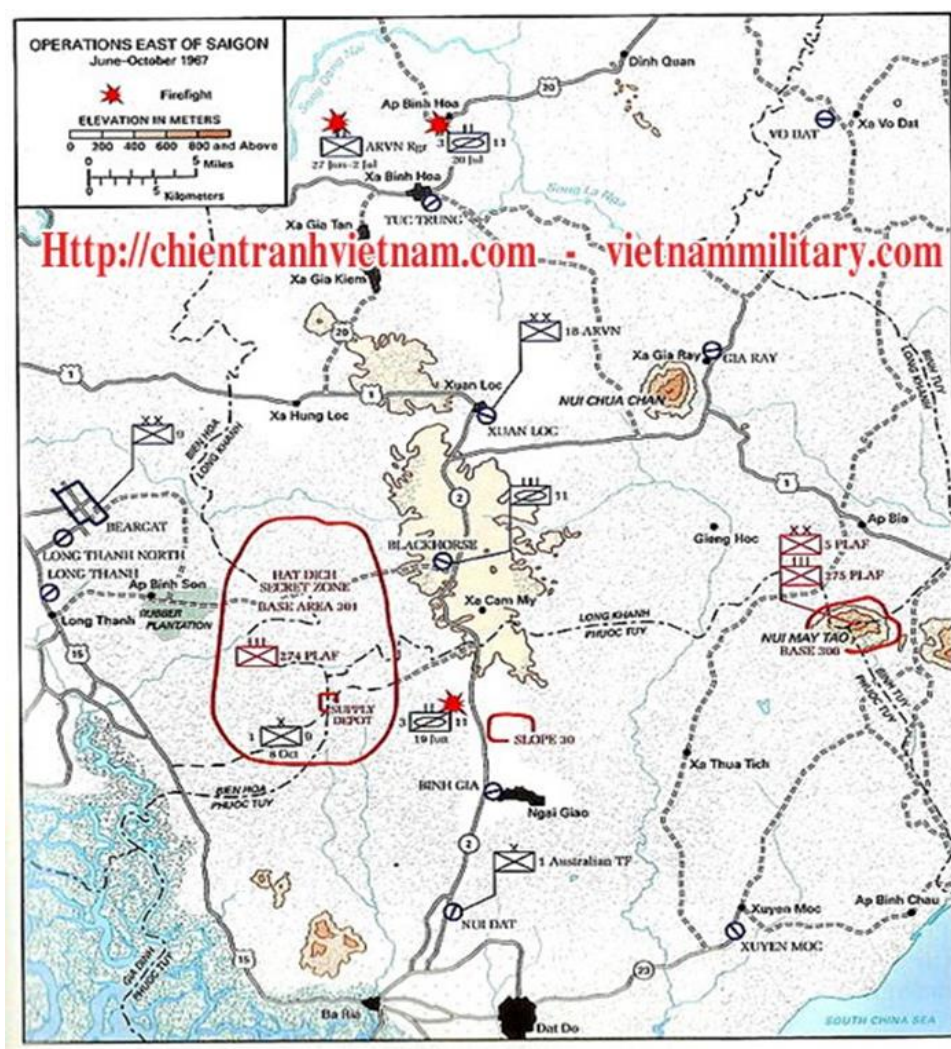
The Battle of the Suối Châu Pha Stream in 1967 took place between Australian forces and Liberation Army in the eastern Hắc Dịch - Hát Dịch region to the north-west of Núi Đất in Phước Tuy Province which nowadays is Bà Rịa Vũng Tàu Province.

The Battle of the Suối Châu Pha that occurred on 6 August 1967, was an engagement during the Ballarat sweeping operation towards the end (sic) of 1967. The Battle of Long Tan in 1966 and the Bribie campaign had weakened Liberation Forces in the region. Brigadier Stuart Graham - the commander of 1 ATF, believed that 275 VC Regiment had been weakened and, accordingly, focused on wiping out 274 VC Regiment.

During July 1967, 274 VC Regiment had moved to the north-east into the Hát Dịch Secret Zone in order to avoid sweeping operations during Operation Paddington and Australian intelligence elements that had

been tracing their radio communications. The Australians launched Operation Ballarat in an area east of Hắc Dịch town (sic). 7RAR – under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Eric Smith established several military positions and set many ambushes. This battalion-level campaign began on 4 August with a move by foot that was planned to surprise the

Liberation Forces. The Australian troops brought enough rations to last five days and swept the area nine kilometres north-west of Núi Đất. The Australian plan remained secret, and the camps and bunkers ... of the Liberation Forces – although discovered, were not to be destroyed until the main force Viet Cong could be destroyed in their rear areas.

The Australian troops also established FSPB Giraffe that was occupied by 105mm M2A2 artillery of 106 Battery. Additionally, US

155mm M109 artillery pieces of the US 2nd Artillery Battalion/35 Artillery Regiment were deployed –and 200mm and long-range 175mm

artillery was also available for support if needed.

An Australian engineer detachment was deployed to clear Route 2 north of Núi Đất, and Delta Company of 2RAR also reinforced the operation – together with A Squadron of 3 Cavalry Regiment (M113s).

The Conduct of the Battle of Suối Châu Pha and Operation Ballarat

Alpha Company 7RAR – under the command of Major Ewart O'Donnell deployed and swept the Hát Dịch region from 3 August. At 10.40hrs on 6 August, they were 10 kilometres to the east of Phú Mỹ and within the Suối Châu Pha area without having been discovered. The Australian troops found a track and laid an ambush. A few minutes later, two Liberation Force soldiers moving along the track were killed – and the Australian troops moved to wipe out the following Liberation Force troops who returned fire fiercely. Alpha Company was in a dangerous situation.

O'Donnell asked Lieutenant Rod Smith – commanding 1 Platoon, to attack the Liberation Forces from the flank, but they struck fierce resistance. Heavy rain began to fall. The Liberation Forces employed “close-in” tactics to lessen the effectiveness of the

American fire support. Lieutenant Neville Clark – the artillery forward observer, had to call for artillery support to within 50 metres of the Australian troops to relieve the pressure on Alpha Company. As a result, that fire support allowed the Australian to seize the advantage.

At 14.30hrs, the Liberation Forces withdrew. Documents seized by the Australians showed that the Liberation Forces belonged to C12 Company of the 274 Regiment's 3rd Battalion – together with a reconnaissance platoon and a number of local troops.

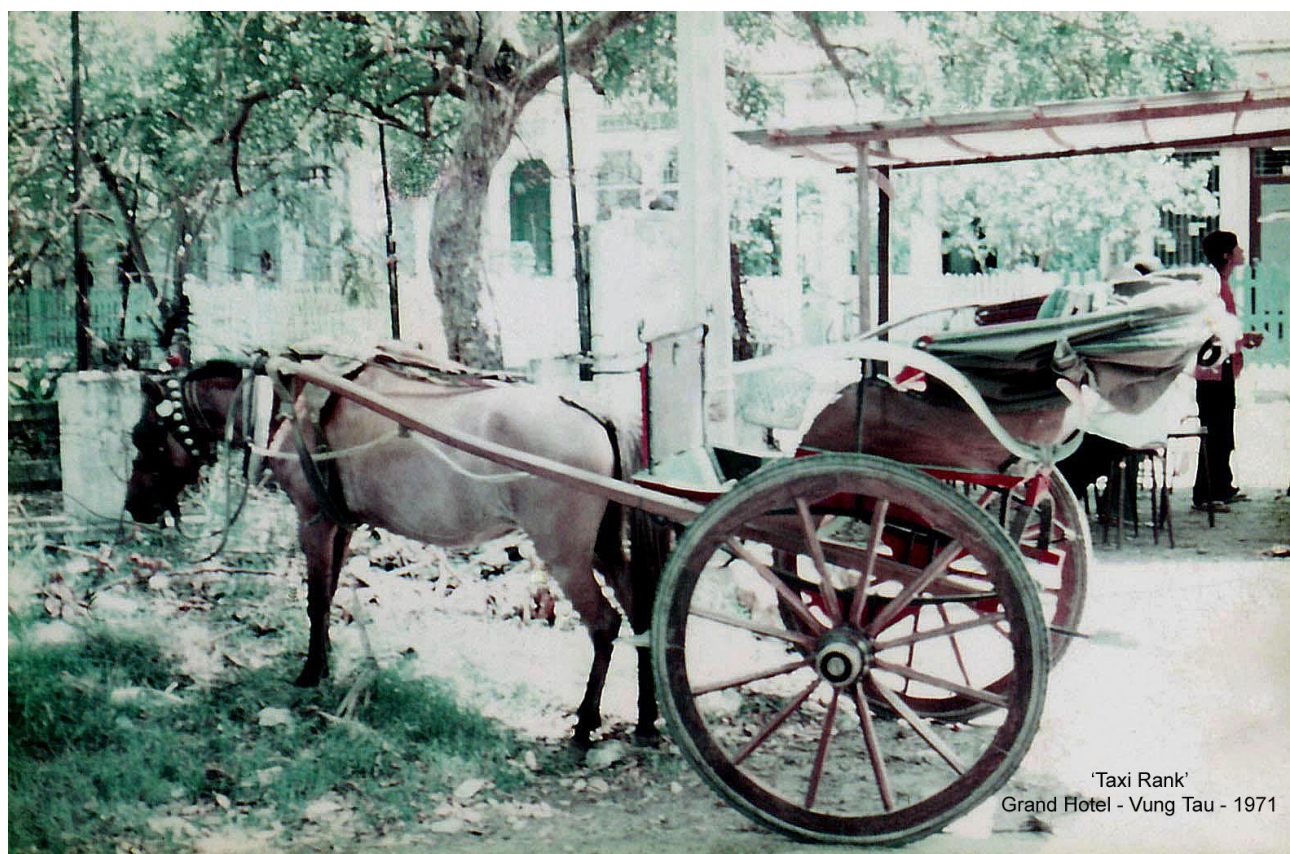
The next day, the Australian forces discovered a Liberation Forces camp about 900 metres from that engagement – and they guessed that C12 Company and a number of other elements that had fought so bravely in order to block the Australians and allow the other units in the camp to escape their assault.

Five Australian soldiers were killed in the Battle of the Suối Châu Pha and one was wounded seriously and also died. 20 others were wounded. Liberation Force casualties are not clear – but five were killed at the site, including a platoon commander, and the Australians seized a machine-gun, a 40mm grenade launcher, and three AK-47s. The following day, the Australian troops destroyed a battalion-sized camp and bunker system – with a large quantity of rice and medical supplies.

Anzac Commemoration Service, Wattle Park (28th April 2019)

The Patriotic Area within Wattle Park is of great significance to those associated with the 24th and 7th Battalion of the 1st and 2nd AIF. It is not generally realised that the first of the 'Lone Pine' seedlings struck from the seed brought back from Gallipoli by a member of the 23rd Battalion is standing in Wattle Park. Beside the Lone Pine is a clock tower monument in memory of Royden Bennett of the 7th Battalion – killed at Pozieres in 1916. The service was held by and on behalf of

The keynote speaker for this service was MAJGEN Mike O'Brien and Ian Dunn and I went along to hear his thought-provoking talk to the assembled crowd. Amongst his examples of war's casualties was Mike Berrigan - dreadfully wounded in Vietnam in 1967 and lingered as a casualty until 2011 - arguably the last victim of the Vietnam War (Lest We Forget).

Our annual ceremony was conducted in the Sanctuary at the Shrine of Remembrance - representing 7th AIF, 2nd/7th AIF and 7RAR. This year we also remember 7th Battalion (39-45).
